Proverbs 24:11-12. ¹¹Deliver those who are drawn toward death, and hold back those stumbling to the slaughter. ¹²If you say, "Surely we did not know this," does not He who weighs the hearts consider it? He who keeps your soul, does He not know it? And will He not render to each man according to his deeds?

Amos 5:16-24. ¹⁶Therefore the Lord God of hosts, the Lord, says this: "There shall be wailing in all streets, and they shall say in all the highways, 'Alas! Alas!' They shall call the farmer to mourning, and skillful lamenters to wailing. ¹⁷In all vineyards there shall be wailing, for I will pass through you," says the Lord.


