The Pastoral Perspective

This past month, at the recommendation of the Mission & Social Action Committee, and after much consideration over many years, the Church Council voted to join the United Valley Interfaith Project (UVIP). By doing this, our congregation has chosen to join with fifteen other faith communities—Christian, Jewish, and Buddhist—in the Upper Valley and neighboring towns to work together for social justice locally and statewide.

"Social justice" is one of those terms that can be both frustratingly vague and politically charged—but that said, it remains a concept with deep roots in our faith tradition. For an example, open your Bible to the prophet Isaiah, so often an inspiration to Jesus, and you'll read of calls to do the right thing by the poor, the outcast, the widow, and the orphan. In his own preaching and teaching, Jesus powerfully called for his followers to heed the words of prophets like Isaiah, Amos, and Micah, likening care for those in need and on the margins with care for him.

In doing so, Jesus taught that such caring in action is fundamental to the life of those who wish to be his followers. In fact, such work is not only central to being a disciple, it's indispensible: recall how Jesus made clear, as had the prophets of ancient Israel before him, that showing up for worship is a waste of time if one isn't helping the least amongst God's people, for the Lord scorns the worship of those who don't help and protect the vulnerable.

As Christians, we are called to stand with those who are without voice or influence. That we may disagree on how best to do this cannot be an excuse for inaction; instead, it should be a spur to find common ground. UVIP's governing model is designed to do just that, seeking to encourage and empower each of its member organizations to help chart the way forward, aiming for a consensus that adds power to the group's work and witness.

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

At June's Council meeting, Treasurer Nan Parsons noted some serious challenges, such as relatively slow pledge progress compared to previous vears. She distributed a spreadsheet surveying the past few years' pledges and expenses, cautioning that we can't indefinitely sustain our current pattern of drawing from endowment principal. More positively, though, the Treasury now owes itself much less than at the start of the year. (Nan has already convened the Finance Committee to address these issues.)

Ron Bailey noted that Stewardship Sunday seems to have been a more emphatic event in years past, and perhaps that could revitalize pledges. While we've tried to promote Stewardship Sunday, Steve Silver pointed out that the Stewardship Committee itself needs more support to strengthen that effort. And several noted that the decreasing size of our regular congregation has certainly affected pledge amounts.

Ion Scott noted that for most of the previous century we drew quite little from the endowment, which thus grew substantially. Thus, while our current rate of draw may not normally be advisable over many years, we should still rely on the stability of our endowment. We need to think creatively about the returns we can make on some upfront investments (in energy efficiency, for example). Jon again stressed the need for collaboration among Stewardship, the Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer, and a more general discussion about pledge practices followed.

Ron Bailey next brought a proposal that FCC should become a full that our church become a full member of the United Valley Interfaith Project (UVIP). We have a history with this organization, which has worked for several years on issues such as aging with dignity and economic justice. Ron noted that the group is energetic and action-oriented; UVIP's executive council "doesn't just meet," it takes concrete steps toward attainable goals. While not yet a full member of UVIP, our church has informally been involved and nominated a "Micah Hero" last fall.

Ron observed that it would be advantageous to participate directly as a UVIP member, as this alliance of faith communities and service organizations can multiply the effects of its individual members' resources. Dues for membership in UVIP are based on a church's budget; for us, annual membership would cost around \$750.

In discussion, Jon Scott pointed out that the Diaconate could likely help fund this expense, and Warren Belding noted that it would be an appropriate use of the Dole Fund. Several observed that our absence among the organizations that are already UVIP members was now conspicuous—while that shouldn't be the first or only reason to join, it does reflect on our leadership among Upper-Valley churches. No one, moreover, has advanced any serious reason why FCC should not join UVIP. Steve Silver also pointed out that UVIP is one of the few contexts where truly multidenominational, interfaith dialogue happens on a regular, formalized basis. Council unanimously voted

member of UVIP.

On behalf of **Christian Education**. Marcia Corkins thanked the entire congregation for so enthusiastically supporting the Church School children, both on Children's Sunday and throughout the year. The kids are very proud of what they've done this year.

For the Stewardship Committee, Jon Scott reported that the UCC had sent new stewardship materials which appear to be promising and effective. They communicate clearly and, Ion feels, would be worth a try in the fall, as we address pledgeseason challenges.

Reporting for the Music Committee, Brian Clancy noted that he hoped to share details soon about Henry Danaher's plans for professional development, for which Henry

hopes to receive financial support. Such training would be directly relevant to his work here at church, in worship and with the choir.

Brian also raised the possibility of accommodating a quintet for a Classicopia concert in August, for which Dan Weiser had inquired about moving Sanctuary pews. Brian explained that this temporary accommodation (not likely to be repeated often, if ever) would only involve sliding a couple pews back into each other, on one half of the Sanctuary. No pews would actually be removed from the space. Council members were satisfied that this wouldn't interfere with worship or other Sanctuary uses, and wouldn't have any permanent consequences.

Nan Parsons revisited the question of purchasing new supplies for the child care and nursery area,

wondering where this proposal now stood. The Diaconate has a donor for this expense; it seems we're waiting only for some initiative toward actually acquiring the items.

In his Pastor's Report, Steve noted that he was participating in several memorial services, both here and elsewhere, as well as in a wedding in Hanover. He also noted firmer plans for an all-church trip to the Congregational Library in Boston. He's working with local pastors to plan this year's Praise in the Park service (July 26), and he's planning to take summer vacation July 6-19 and August 24-September 7.

DIACONATE

In June the Deacons discussed communion assignments. The tablecloth that was given to us by the church in San Jose Villanueva could not be located for communion on Children's Sunday, but it has since been found. Susan Montmagny volunteered to supply communion bread beginning July 5.

Jon Scott led further discussion on the church's safety policies. Steve Silver pointed out that there are two pertinent documents—the Safe Church Policy and the Sunday Morning Safety Protocol—available to anyone for review.

Jon also provided an update on the Facebook trials he has conducted in recent weeks.

In his pastor's report, Steve Silver confirmed his summer vacation dates, and the Deacons discussed arrangements for worship in his absence. Biff Simpson will lead worship on July 12, while Hilary

Call for Nominations — 4th Annual Micah Awards Sponsored by the United Valley Interfaith Project (UVIP)

The prophet Micah calls us to consider what it means to live into God's expectations for us, offering guidance on how to live up to those expectations: "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8)

UVIP's Micah Awards annually recognize local "Micah Heroes" who live into the prophet's words in some exemplary manner—people who contribute abundant time and energy to community service, who consistently volunteer themselves to work for a vital cause, who offer their community a living role model of faith in service. As our church joins UVIP as a full member this summer, our congregation is invited to choose its Micah Hero for the year.

All are welcome to nominate up to three members of our congregation who best represent the spirit of the Micah Awards (only last year's winner, Ron Bailey, is ineligible). The individual who receives the most votes will be our congregation's Micah Hero for 2015. Please keep in mind that this is an annual award, so nominations typically reflect service during the previous year (next year's Micah Hero will be someone new, and many will have an opportunity for this recognition).

Nominations (up to three per person) must be submitted to the church office no later than Monday, August 31. Please contact the office with any questions.

MEMORIAL GARDENS COMMITTEE

The church's Memorial Gardens Committee reports that the two gardens in front of the church have been replanted and mulched by Nora and Todd Miller, who donated all the plants and materials. Many thanks from the congregation! The Howard Garden, where the church sign stands in front of the church, was originally donated by the Howard children in honor of their parents. The Memorial Garden, where family ashes may be interred, was created in 2003. For more information about either garden, please contact a member of the committee or the Church Administrator.

MISSION AND SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

Committee members met with Barbara Farnsworth, Executive Director of Second Growth, to talk about what we as a congregation can do to help her organization. She said that aside from donations, the best way would probably be to attend a training session for suicide prevention. FCC will try to host one of these sessions and invite other local churches to join us.

The committee voted unanimously to recommend membership in the United Valley Interfaith Project, which we then brought to Council for approval. We look forward to working with UVIP on many projects, such as making the lives of senior citizens more dignified.

We hosted about 30 young adults from Bike & Build again this year. Many thanks to Amy Driscoll, Jon Scott, and John Gilliatt for organizing the build-your-own pizza dinner; to Steve Teeter for coordinating the visit and cooking breakfast; and to all who helped out with the ecumenical potluck supper and ice-cream-sundae party prior to their presentation.

We meet next in September, when the Crop Walk will be our focus.

What's WIC?

Getting to Know One of FCC's Regular Guests

For almost a year now, First Congregational Church has hosted twice-monthly clinics operated by New Hampshire's Women, Infants, and Children Program—popularly known as WIC. Subject to certain income guidelines, families can obtain free health screenings, nutritional education and advice, breastfeeding support, and service referrals. (And despite the acronym, fathers routinely utilize WIC services too!) As an itinerant program with limited resources, WIC depends on sites across the state that offer enough space for its clinics at minimal cost.

Practicing responsible healthcare and nutrition can be challenging for any family, but without WIC's support it would be impossible for many parents with limited means and working multiple jobs. WIC offers these parents vital assistance, and they in turn are tremendously grateful. "Thanks to WIC," says a typical client, "my children's health is on track."

By offering this important program the space it needs, our congregation extends the love and compassion that Christ modeled and asked us to share with each other.

In addition to operating WIC clinics in Grafton County, the Belknap-Merrimack Community Action Program manages CSFP, a free healthy-food program for qualifying seniors. This statefunded resource offers up to \$50 worth of food monthly to anyone aged 60 years or older who needs help in stretching their food budget.

By joining UVIP our church continues this tradition, writing a new chapter in our story of responding to God's call to care for his people.
