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The Pastoral Perspective

This year, we will celebrate Easter, the Feast of the Resurrection, on April 20. Our faith teaches us that some two thousand years ago, Jesus, who had been executed by the Romans, was raised from the dead and thus conquered death itself.

And yet we still die.

What gives?

I'd like to take this opportunity to go back with you in time. Specifically, five years. You may recall that it was five years ago March that pandemic shutdowns began. I remember this clearly. Why? Because Salt Hill, which traditionally opens early on the morning of St. Patrick's Day, was closed. The crowds that usually gathered for the first pint were absent, as the pub's biggest sales day of the year had been canceled. But they stayed in business, as did many other eateries in Lebanon. They adapted to the new rhythms of life. We all did.

And now, here we are. In many ways, we experienced resurrection. We were brought back to life. We resumed in-person gatherings like worship. We resumed hosting community dinners. Musical performances continue to delight audiences. And all of this is good. Frustratingly, though, we still live in a world where stupidity is all too often the order of the day.

Is this what new life is supposed to feel like?

Who knows?

But "resurrection" or "new life" is something we experience as a community, and we experience it as individuals. It may be a simple as getting another chance, the opportunity of enjoying a fresh start.

Don't get me wrong. I am not claiming the physical resurrection of Jesus did not happen. I believe that the resurrection of Christ is central to our faith, is part of what makes it so important. But.

Yes, you knew there was a "but" coming.

But.

We will, in all likelihood, never experience a physical resurrection, but we can experience real resurrection, an opportunity to start over. We don't

CHURCH COUNCIL

With several members unable to attend, Council's March meeting was briefer than usual. Rev. Steve Silver opened his **pastor's report** with a focus on his recent health episode. He expressed great thanks to the congregation for its support and prayers, and he commended Bob Gerlach in particular for ably assisting Pastor Mark Zimmerman to lead the Ash Wednesday service at the Methodist Church.

Steve also noted that he expects to discuss his **sabbatical plans** with the Personnel Committee soon, as he considers making arrangements. The committee will meet to address several topics in the first week of April and then discuss sabbatical details directly with Steve.

Appealing again for improvement of the **Sanctuary sound system**, Steve specified his hope that individual mics could be muted on Zoom. The pulpit mic tends to amplify his own hymn singing, which he would prefer not be audible. Jon suggested that a workgroup assess needs, preferences, and questions regarding the system, to have something in place for the fall if not sooner. If the expense is significant, we may need to budget it next year. Jon noted we haven't yet selected a contractor for this project. Speaking as a frequent Zoom viewer, Valerie Nevel shared appreciation for Steve's clarity and repetition of remarks from the congregation, as those aren't usually audible on the stream. An improved system would include the capacity for extending mics to those in the congregation. Ion affirmed the urgency to move forward on this issue, perhaps with advice from UVMC next door.

Jon asked Corrine to lay out her plans for the revived **bylaws review committee**, and she noted that it

would meet March 30 after worship. She anticipates going through the current bylaws to identify what can be retained and what needs revision. Crediting the previous committee's work, Corrine believes that many issues have already been resolved, and she doesn't expect the current committee's work to require more than a few hours in all.

Reporting on Walter Scott's behalf for the **Board of Governors**, Jon explained that we're awaiting more favorable weather and a clear stretch in the church calendar to complete

our renovation of the front steps. Walter has secured the westernmost exterior door to the Sanctuary and plans to improve its weather seal. We also intend to address the side access ramp, determining whether it is optimally designed and making necessary upgrades. Valerie asked about improving drainage on that side of the building, which poses a winter safety issue, and asked about the cost of the steps renovation. She also recommended contacting the City regarding its insufficient snow clearance along the sidewalk in front of the church on Park Street.

Valerie reported that the Mission and Social Action Committee would now meet every other month (rather than monthly), given a relative lack of business to cover. She recently attended a housing group meeting and noted the passage of a recovery housing article in the latest round of city elections. Lamenting the rise of food insecurity locally, Valerie also suggested that Steve discuss with UVMC the possibility of their leading a community dinner. Ion added that he plans to work with Walter to repair the wind-damaged banner frame over the front door, with the intention then to display the original banner that welcomes immigrants and refugees.

Valerie continued with a report that the Personnel Committee, partly in response to recommendations in our 2024 audit, is developing guidelines for debit-card expenses along with an employee handbook, in order to create consistency in holidays, vacation time, and other areas. She noted that she had some questions on the monthly incomeexpense report, to be addressed later by the **Finance Committee**.

DIACONATE

Dawn Troutman opened the March Diaconate meeting with a devotion about keeping faith during a time of underlying worries. Our church offers a safe, welcoming environment. Rev. Silver also recognized how his recent health issue coincides with Lent's emphasis on mortality.

The Deacons also discussed some preparations for **Holy Week** services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday, with a familiar

sunrise service and light breakfast at FCC before the main service at 10:00. The group considered the need for ushers and readers, as well as how to promote the services.

Steve plans to begin his **sabbatical** in June with an educational program in Texas. Accordingly, **Children's Sunday** is likely to be scheduled in May. The Deacons reiterated our need to draw more kids to FCC.

A training session, to be offered on a Sunday after worship, will cover topics like the calendar for liturgical paraments. Regarding our bylaws review, the Deacons agreed their current number (8) is sufficient.

Focus on Stewardship

Whether dropped in the plate on a Sunday or mailed into the office, your offering contributions continue to be vital to our ministry. Any donation in a communion envelope goes to this fund, but you may contribute to the Open Door Ministry at any other time, too.

Special Offerings (e.g., the Lenten Lunch Bag Offering, Blanket and Shelter Sundays, and UCC offerings such as Neighbors in Need or One Great Hour of Sharing)—Collected once a year, in conjunction with an event or national campaign for a mission or service cause.
