The Pastoral Perspective

Is there anything new to say about Lent? We observe the season, year in and year out, taking up disciplines, forgoing vices or pleasures. We read the stories of Jesus heading into the desert, where he was tempted by Satan; we dive into his trial before Pilate; then we cap it all off with the Passion and finally move into Easter. Why not just take a pass on it all, and get to the good stuff of the Resurrection?

Well, we could do that. In fact, it would be a very modern way of managing the situation. Focus on the good, take the way we find affirming, and if we can do it in a 140-character tweet, all the better. But it's not the Christian way. Our tradition recognizes that with lightness there is darkness, and with good there is evil. Rather than simply dismiss what is wrong with the world or our own lives, we are called to confront it. Lent is traditionally a season of repentance and of preparation. We ready ourselves not only for the miracle of Easter, but for a fuller, more meaningful living of our lives.

Lent is not just the warm-up for Easter. It's a time to recognize there are things we need to do, things that we might well leave undone given our druthers. It's a time to reflect, a time to set things right, a time to, yes, repent.

You need to repent. So do I. We have sinned, on our own and as a society. Sadly, we will continue to sin. But Lent isn't a time to wallow in our fallen state. It is something more hopeful. Lent is a way of saying we want to do better, that we know God wants us to do better, to be better. It may take some work, but we can do it. We may get lost or distracted, but we will find our way. Like exercising, it will take time and commitment. We will need to dedicate ourselves to a program and a schedule. We will need to pray, to reflect, to read Scripture, to consider what we value—and what we ought to value.

There is no resurrection without crucifixion. It's a cliché, but we Christians know that it is true. Fortunately, Jesus has gone to the


In both cases, this Lenten offering allows FCC's children to help other children in challenging circumstances, encouraging them to consider stewardship as a way to share God's love.

COMMITTEE NOTES

COUNCIL

At Council in January, John Gilliatt reviewed the Board of Governors' budget priorities for the year and explained plans for several projects. A comprehensive upgrade of the church's insulation can be divided into three portions: areas between the Sanctuary and Parish Hall, the area above the Sanctuary ceiling, and the cellar underneath. The Board continues to consider Sanctuary floor refinishing, carpeting, and new pew cushions. Kitchen improvements are also a priority, although opinions are split between full renovation and a more modest "face-lift" approach. There are a few significant projects at the Parsonage, including chimney re-lining and possible sewer-line renovations. Accepting that these projects would need to be spread over multiple years, Council agreed that the Board should determine their order of priority.

John also reviewed smaller pending projects that the Board had hoped to complete in 2017, including the sealing of cracks in the front walk and the installation of railings on the chancel steps. He reported that a recent malfunction of one of our AED units had been resolved, and that an inquiry about outdoor lighting in our rear parking lot had been addressed.

Council also discussed arrangements for **winter-weather maintenance**, in light of dangerous conditions from recent storms and harsh cold. While Kevin Charbono has been dependable in plowing our lot and Nathaniel Cole in clearing our sidewalks, it remains a challenge to keep our grounds safe on a daily, consistent basis, raising concerns for personal injury and church liability at worship or other events during the week. Congregation members and staff have voluntarily helped on an ad-hoc basis, but Council might perhaps consider hiring a property management service for more comprehensive maintenance.

Treasurer Terry Ellison revisited the question of opening a church credit card, reiterating that we need a longer established audit history to arrange one. (Valerie Nevel reported for the **Trustees** that an audit of the church's 2017 financial activity was ongoing, with reports expected soon.) In the meantime, it would suffice to set up a debit card, assuming such a card would carry spending limits and other controls. Council agreed that a debit card would work with those conditions in place, and it unanimously voted to authorize a card for the Pastor. Church Administrator, and Board of Governors chair. The Finance Committee will determine monthly and transactional limits.

For **Stewardship**, Jon Scott again asked that committee chairs seek 2018 pledges from their fellow members. We are a bit behind in the number of pledges compared to recent years, having received just under 30 to date. Jon also reported that plans for online giving had stalled because we lack official IRS recognition of our tax-exemption. Finance and Stewardship will consult on this matter prior to the next meeting of Council.

The Mission and Social Action Committee has been discussing immigration issues and ways FCC might helpfully get involved. Steve Silver reported that Tom Smith (Wendell's nephew) would speak to the congregation about his advocacy organization, Justice at Work, which

FCC Annual Meeting 2018—Sunday, February 11, at 11:15 am

The Annual Meeting of First Congregational Church of Lebanon, NH, will be held in the Parish Hall on Sunday, February 11, 2018, immediately following the worship service, for the purpose of:

1. The election of all officers provided for under the CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the church.

2. To hear the reports of all officers, committees, and organizations, as required under the CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the church.

3. To consider and act upon any other matters relating to the general church welfare that may properly come before this meeting, including but not limited to the following:

A. The Mission and Social Action Committee moves that First Congregational Church of Lebanon endorse and participate in the work of the New Hampshire Immigrant Solidarity Network. A full statement from the NHISN describing its work and commitment to solidarity is posted in the Parish Hall and online at www.fccleb.org; it may also be found in the Appendix of the Annual Report.

employs immigrants to assist other immigrants' efforts to find legal and economic stability. Valerie Nevel mentioned a woman who has done similar work locally through WISE. The NH Conference also supports the Immigration Solidarity Network, by which Meriden Congregational Church has designated itself as a "sanctuary church." While FCC wouldn't necessarily seek the same status, Steve has spoken with Rev. John Gregory-Davis about how we might support their efforts. Steve noted that MSA will present a broad resolution about immigration to the congregation at Annual Meeting.

It was also reported from MSA that FCC would not be able to offer the necessary support for a grant to stop fracking expansion in Pennsylvania.

Jon Scott reported on two issues for the **Diaconate**. First was the question of how the church should manage the role of charter representative for the Scouting program. Individual church members have done this in the past, but some wonder whether Council or another committee should assume this oversight. Steve Silver will ascertain what responsibilities are involved with Biff Simpson, our current Scouting liaison.

Second, the Deacons have been considering how to engage our congregation in a discussion of race, in a spirit similar to our conversations about immigration. Such a discussion need not be divisive or politicized, but it must be framed in a sensitive way, in order to cultivate learning and the potential for action.

In his **pastor's report,** Steve Silver strongly encouraged Council to consider how we will observe our congregation's 250th anniversary this year. While he noted modest gestures such as guest preachers and musical events, he again raised the idea of a capital campaign, for which an ad-hoc committee would have to be formed very soon. Steve emphasized that this must be driven by the congregation (not by him as pastor), which needs to determine funding priorities for a campaign. Steve reported that a draft budget would be forthcoming, following ongoing consultations with the Treasurer and Trustees. The 2018 budget will be largely similar to last year's, though obviously without sabbatical expenses. Steve noted that the Nominating Committee has been making good progress on this year's committee roster.

Amid his regular pastoral duties, Steve has joined APD's Life Care Board and will travel to Cleveland this month for a meeting of the UCC's Historical Council.

DIACONATE

The Deacons in January recognized the passing of Reuben Cole and expressed sympathy and support for the entire Cole family. They reviewed a number of **pastoral care** concerns, including the continuing gratitude for prayer shawls, the provision of worship transportation, and the recognition of birthdays and

prayer requests through Deacons' individual member contacts.


All expressed appreciation for Steve Silver's presentation during Advent on **prayer**. Suggestions for future presentations include community prayer, praying with scripture, and meditative prayer. An email address dedicated to prayer requests has now been set up; because prayer concerns can be sensitive, Steve will review them with the assistance of a deacon.

Jon Scott shared his thoughts on the congregation's discussion of the sensitive issues of **race and racism**. He encouraged deacons to listen to an NPR program, "The Invention of Race," as a starting point. FCC will offer **services at Genesis** again in March. Kathy Beckett and Steve Teeter offered to lead them; additional future participation will be determined.

In his **pastor's report** Steve Silver noted the resolution to join the NH Immigrant Solidarity Network, to be brought to Annual Meeting. Scripture is clear, he observed, about how to treat the stranger, and we as a congregation have a responsibility to speak up. He also encouraged a congregational conversation on race, asking the Deacons to lead such an effort. He stressed that this issue, like immigration, is a matter of how we live our faith, and this conversation shouldn't be reduced to a political or partisan argument.

Biff Simpson asked if the Scouting program should fall under the Diaconate, Church Council, or Mission and Social Action. Jon will approach Council with a request that they take lead responsibility, with support from Diaconate. A deacon could act as liaison, or we would recruit someone from the congregation. Deacons will also help with Scout Sunday planning.

The **next meeting** of the Diaconate will occur at the Woodlands on February 12. Barb Teeter will lead February and March meetings while Barb Jones is away.
