The Pastoral Perspective

After last year brought us an early Ash Wednesday and Lent, this year we have the opportunity to enjoy an extra-long Epiphany. What exactly does this mean for us? After all, it's not as if we celebrate anything. We don't have special services or liturgies to perform. To me, Epiphany is more a state of mind, a context in which we pray and reflect. Yes, on the silly side, we may be grateful that with the Lenten season starting in March we will observe a later Easter—and thus have a better chance of not freezing at the sunrise service. But more consequently, this is a moment to ask whether we are using this extra time to focus on the ways that God has revealed himself to us. My hope and prayer is that we are.

This extended season is a good time to reflect on how God makes himself known to us. How has the Holy Spirit moved in your life and heart? How has Jesus been revealed to you? It need not be through a vision or revelation or mountaintop experience but in the reading or hearing of Scripture, an act of kindness you witnessed or performed, or perhaps in a musical performance you attended or heard on the radio. The persons of the Trinity, but especially Jesus Christ, make themselves known in all sorts of ways, and we, in turn, may make him known to others.

February is when churches often have annual meetings, the time when they consider attendance statistics, survey how many gifts were given, or debate a particular warrant article. But I'd like to suggest that as we look at statistics and issues we remember to focus on those who volunteer. It is not only through our service that the church, not just First Congregational but also the worldwide communion of the faithful, continues; it's also through our service that God makes his presence felt in our community. Recall Jesus saying that we are his hands and his feet! Think of those people serving dinners, singing music, doing the numbers, tidying up the sanctuary, welcoming newcomers. All are doing the work of the Risen Christ. When you volunteer, think about how the Lord has made himself known to us through fellowship and service. And then think of how, through you, he is also making himself known.

Happy Epiphany!

COMMITTEE NOTES

CHURCH COUNCIL

At the January Council meeting, John Gilliatt reported for the **Board of Governors** on insulation projects in various interior spaces around the Parish Hall and office areas. We are working on estimates and planning for the much larger insulation jobs for Sanctuary ceiling and basement. We are also in process of arranging for a Parsonage energy audit.

Valerie Nevel noted the **Trustees'** 2018 year-end reports show our investment performance suffered from overall market declines. We made three distributions in 2018 from the Dole Fund for mission purposes; Dole capital funds still accrue, although we didn't make use of them during the year.

Pete Mason observed, with gratitude and poignancy, that after roughly four decades serving FCC in many roles, this would be his last Council meeting, as he will be rotating off the **Memorial Gardens** Committee. Brandon Mason will succeed him as chair. Everyone recognized and thanked Pete for being such a longterm, exemplary leader of FCC.

Marcia Corkins noted that the Christmas pageant was a success, thanking Rachel Silver and others for coordinating it. **Christian Education**'s next project will be the annual Lenten Lunch Bag offering.

Amy Driscoll stated that this year's **Nominating** process was in good shape for Annual Meeting. A key challenge is filling the Diaconate, because of recent turnover and the demands of serving as a deacon. She noted that Council at-large positions offer good opportunities for newer members, introducing them to many FCC programs. Amy also reminded everyone that the Nominating Committee itself needs new members.

Brian Clancy noted for the **Music Committee** that winter and spring offer a typical concert schedule, with another event in the LOH on Location series (Lula Wiles, February 8). Asked about the prospect of another area church-choir festival, Brian could confirm only that a directors' group is considering a mid-late March date, with no definite details as yet.

Plans are taking shape for **Paul Ayres' visit on March 2-3**, with a choral workshop, commissioned anthem, and organ recital all on the schedule. Responding to a question about funding for Paul's visit, Steve Silver noted that a church member was generously helping to support it.

Speaking for **Mission and Social Action**, Corrine Erskine looked ahead to the annual Souper Bowl food collection and a plan to fill a shopping cart in March with food donations, to raise awareness of poverty in our community.

Jon Scott noted for **Stewardship** that we've received about ten fewer pledges than at this point in typical years. Jon reminded us that pledges are important for leadership and planning, not just dollar amounts, and he urged committee leaders to set examples by pledging. Discussion ensued about the difference between pledges and outright gifts, and about reasons why people might or might not submit pledges.

In his **pastor's report** Steve shared thanks for a successful Advent and Christmas season. All Christmas Eve services drew a great turnout, with around 90 for the Family Service and, more unusually, over 50 and 35 for the two later services, respectively. Many were new visitors.

Steve also proposed that we might consider reassigning some of our yearly **NHC-UCC dues contribution** to our Open Door Ministry, thus shifting support from conference programs to local needs. He briefly explained that conference dues fund programs and services that benefit all NHC congregations, but he sees the rising local demand for financial assistance as more pressing.

There was some discussion of how our dues (currently \$7,000) are set; the conference recommends an amount according to a church's membership. We are updating our membership rolls, and we've reduced dues in the past for reasons unrelated to membership. All agreed that we should support our state conference over the national UCC. Council voted unanimously to cut conference dues in half and reassign \$3,500 to the Open Door Ministry.

From Church Council and the Nominating Committee Volunteer Opportunities Still Available

As we approach a new year and a new term for FCC's volunteer committees, Church Council and the Nominating Committee ask you to consider how you might best contribute your skills, interests, and energy to the church's operations, ministries, and mission.

There was additional discussion about where **Open Door Ministry** funds come from. Funds for food and gas cards come from monthly communion offering by way of the Deacons' Fund. That fund was closed and added to the general treasury account in May 2018, but we still designate communion collections for this. Additional Open Door assistance for rent and utilities comes from the separate Mission and Social Action account, which is funded by the Dole Trust.

Resuming his **pastor's report**, Steve expressed great thanks to Marcia Corkins for her years of service as Church School Superintendent, from which she will be retiring on June 30. All joined in thanking Marcia! Discussions about leadership of Christian Education next year are ongoing.

Steve explained that our **capital campaign** was in "hibernation," still with the intention of inviting input from the congregation in the near future. Revisiting plans we made last fall with consultant Bob Barr, we realized that first approaching individual donors wasn't the right model for our church. Bob would have implemented such a strategy, but we couldn't provide him the appropriate background and funding guidance. Interest in a campaign exists at a wide variety of levels.

Lastly, there was general concern about snow removal, specifically the clearance of walkways and the condition of the walk along the east side of the Sanctuary. All agreed that walk should be marked "closed" for the winter. Chip Silver was hired and trained to maintain walkways with the snow blower, and the Board of Governors has placed buckets of salt and calcium chloride at all entrances. However, there will always be a need for volunteers to clear the walks on occasion. Steve Silver volunteered to make sure walks are salted on Sunday mornings, as he typically arrives earlier than anyone else.

DIACONATE

At the January Diaconate meeting, Alyson Danyew-Ellison reported on the status of **funds for food and gas cards**. Thanks to contributions from January's communion offering, the account has a balance of over \$3,200. Brian Clancy has explained that we now offer a choice of one type of card or the other (not both), except for first-time recipients. The 2019 budget process will allocate more to this purpose than last year.

As part of his **pastor's report** Steve Silver noted the need to increase adult engagement in church school, and reported that new members would be received on Annual Meeting Sunday. He also noted that Genesis has asked us to do additional services in 2019, but a few transitions on the Diaconate prevent us from committing now.

Kathy Beckett expressed support for **engaging more young people** in church. She mentioned a clergy caucus in which Steve is interested. He will speak with other Lebanon churches about possibilities for ecumenical youth service projects.

Phil Hammond reported that the audio system for worship remains problematic, given variations in speaker volume and interference with personal hearing devices. Steve proposed looking at the budget and anniversary campaign for an investment in an appropriate longterm solution. The Deacons also discussed the speed of lectionary readings, suggesting more time for congregants to find the indicated pages if not printed in the bulletin. Liturgist training could be helpful.

Biff Simpson asked the Diaconate to consider how we handle political activism in the church environment. In general, it is expected that faith beliefs influence one's stance on political questions, and drawing a line between church and state is inherently challenging.

The need to fill Diaconate vacancies was discussed. Some current deacons have increased demands on their time; others face term limits.
