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The Pastoral Perspective

The big story as I write this is the spread of COVID-19, which is the official name of the coronavirus that first emerged in Wuhan, China, at the end of last year. In just a few months, some 90,000 people have been infected worldwide and 3,000 have died, most of them, again, in China. Comparisons are already being drawn with the Spanish flu epidemic of 1918, in which an estimated 500 million were infected and some 50 million died—675,000 of them here in the United States. So, are we facing a modern day version of the Black Death? Or is this all a lot of overblown hooey, given that this season's flu illnesses will claim 32-54 million victims, of whom 18,000-46,000 will die.

I'm not a doctor, and this is not a medical newsletter. But as your pastor, and as a member of this faith community, I do see all of us having a responsibility to take an emerging health danger seriously but calmly; to provide comfort and support to those dealing with anxiety and fear or actual illness; and to remind ourselves that while science and religion have much to say to each other, they do not speak interchangeably. I can say with a high degree of confidence that COVID-19 is not being inflicted upon us either by a wrathful God or by a malevolent Devil. It is a simple case of nature making itself known to us, of a virus doing what viruses do, leaping from one species to another with devastating efficiency.

Yes, we should pray to God for those who are ill and those who care for them, seeking strength, comfort, and healing. Yes, we should remember that our church is open to all, including those who don't look like us. And yes, we should take to our hearts the words spoken in Scripture by divine messengers to Mary, the shepherds, and the women at the cave where Jesus had been laid to rest after the crucifixion—"Be not afraid."

"Be not afraid" doesn't mean setting aside precautions or indulging in foolhardy behavior. It means having the courage to face whatever life

COMMITTEE NOTES

ANNUAL MEETING 2020

FCC's 2020 Annual Meeting was an efficient, straightforward affair. After Moderator Amy Driscoll confirmed a quorum and the Rev. Steve Silver offered an invocation, committee reports proceeded smoothly, with few additions to what had been printed in the 2019 Annual Report. Trustee chair Valerie Nevel read aloud the names of those whose bequests have provided so generously for FCC over the years, and Stewardship chair Jon Scott added thanks for generations of congregation members who have supported the church financially.

On behalf of Mission and Social Action, Kathy Beckett noted that the committee wanted to serve the congregation better in determining purposes and beneficiaries of our mission support. Corrine Erskine acknowledged that her otherwise thorough church history omitted mention of the 23 shoebox gifts donated for Operation Christmas Child in November.

Nominating chair Amy Driscoll reviewed a revised committee slate given out at the meeting, pointing out a few updates since the printed report. She explained the difference between positions that are marked vacant (mandated by our by-laws) and those that are open (allowable but not required). Acknowledging the number of positions that need to be filled, Amy invited everyone to consider volunteering. She thanked those who already have found meaning in some service context or volunteer calling, but she recognized that we often end

up asking and relying on the same group of people.

Barb Jones added a plea specifically for **Nominating Committee** help, and Terry Ellison and Kathy Beckett both volunteered to join. In another nomination from the floor, Steve Teeter offered to serve on Christian Education.

Wendell Smith confirmed that he would continue as the Board of Governors' representative on the Finance Committee. He also asked whether the **Scouting** program had representation on any committee, offering to serve in that role; it was clarified that Council oversees our relationship with the Scouts.

Valerie Nevel confirmed that the representatives on the **Finance Committee** will be chosen by the other relevant committees, and she pointed out that the Auditor role is being filled by Parkers Accounting, a hired consultant. Amy clarified that both the Auditor and Assistant Treasurer positions still have to be listed because they both remain in the church's *By-laws*.

Since just four positions are listed on the nominating roster for Church Council, it was explained that the membership of Council consists mostly of the chairs of all the other committees and programs, chosen by the committees themselves and thus not elected by the congregation at Annual Meeting. This group of representatives and the four elected positions make up Council's voting members. Any of the congregation may attend any meeting of Church Council (or any other committee) without voting on business items.

The full slate of nominees for committee positions was approved unanimously at the meeting.

Amy Driscoll, as both Moderator and outgoing Nominating chair, asked that we all seriously consider our collective volunteer load. This has long been a challenge for our regular membership, and the many committees and roles established decades ago do not necessarily align with the activities, interests, and responsibilities that we currently need to accommodate and cover as a congregation. Rev. Steve Silver cautioned that assessing and revising our committee structure requires careful deliberation and may be long, as he's discussed with pastoral colleagues who have recently undertaken this process at their churches, such as the Rev. Amy Hayden at Lyme Congregational Church.

While he recognizes the importance of committee restructuring, Steve maintained that our priority now should be our **capital campaign**. Despite wide agreement about its necessity, campaign planning has

moved slowly, and it's important to make some public, congregational affirmation of its goals. Steve then reviewed these three broad purposes, as the planning committee has refined them-Community Care (our facilities for congregational service and ministry), Creation Care (environmental stewardship and resource conservation), and Mission (our commitment to direct ten percent of the total raised toward local and global mission purposes). Each area offers scalable goals that can be addressed in whole or in part depending on money raised. The active campaign will have a short duration of just three months, after which pledges may be paid over a period of years. Steve thanked the individual members of the planning committee (Lola Baldwin, Kathy

Beckett, Amy Driscoll, Corrine Erskine, Barb Jones, Barb Laro, Sue Pratt, Ion Scott, and Wendell Smith). Those at the meeting unanimously endorsed the inauguration of the campaign.

The Moderator invited questions and discussion next of the Finance Committee's proposed budget for 2020, as published in the Annual Report. Without further discussion, the congregation unanimously approved the budget for this year.

In another item of new business, Steve Teeter proposed that FCC's music library be named in honor and memory of Ruth Friend, who passed away in June of 2019. There was general agreement that such a recognition would be an appropriate and thoughtful gesture, and it was

recommended that the Music Committee follow up.

Before the meeting adjourned, the Rev. Steve Silver thanked everyone for participating, and for offering such kind recognition of the tenth anniversary of his service at FCC. He expressed his gratitude for the congregation's vital role in his own faith journey, and he observed the passage of time, the growth of the church's families, and the ongoing history of congregational events. He shared his hopes for our future and reflected that we are together all called to be servants.

After Steve closed the meeting with the benediction, the congregation sang the final hymn and adjourned for a sumptuous, delicious potluck lunch and great fellowship.

DIACONATE

In February the Deacons welcomed their two **newest members**, Linda Gerlach and Dawn Troutman. Barb Teeter is now serving as Diaconate chair, with Alyson Danyew-Ellison and Bob Gerlach continuing as Treasurer and Secretary, respectively. Stacey Steele volunteered to serve as a co-chair. Barb also asked for a second Diaconate representative on the Pastoral Relations Committee, for which Bob volunteered.

Following up an Annual Meeting discussion, the Deacons anticipate an update of **church membership**

rolls and their individual member contact lists. The group discussed the basis on which inactive members should be retained, depending on how recently they've had contact with the church. The Deacons also considered ways of introducing and integrating new members, and raised the prospect of a new church directory, perhaps self-published rather than produced by an outside photography studio. (*Note:* Copies of the 2016 directory are available for anyone who would like one.)

In his pastor's report, Steve Silver noted the installation of the first of two railings on the chancel steps, of which the Deacons enthusiastically approved. He commended interim organist Susan Sorensen for her work so far, adding that the search for a permanent successor is underway. He also thanked everyone, on behalf of his family, for the recognition of his tenth anniversary at FCC.

Steve invited the Deacons to attend Eliot Fay's ecclesiastical council on March 8 in Bradford, VT. This is the next step in Eliot's journey toward ordination and a pastoral call, ideally back in New Hampshire, where his family would like to return.


